Summary of Cases Accepted and Related Actions During Week of August 24, 2020

[This news release is issued to inform the public and the press of cases that the Supreme Court has accepted and of their general subject matter. The statement of the issue or issues in each case set out below does not necessarily reflect the view of the court, or define the specific issues that will be addressed by the court.]

#20-231 People v. Federico, S263082. (E072620; 50 Cal.App.5th 318; Riverside County Superior Court County Superior Court; SWF017423.) Petition for review after the Court of Appeal affirmed a judgment of conviction of criminal offenses. This case presents the following issue: Did defendant's resentencing pursuant to Penal Code section 1170, subdivision (d)(1) "reopen" the finality of his sentence, such that he was entitled to the retroactive application of Proposition 57 and Senate Bill No. 1391 on an otherwise long-final conviction? (See also People v. Padilla, S263375 (#20-232).

#20-232 People v. Padilla, S263375. (B297213; 50 Cal.App.5th 244; Los Angeles County Superior Court; TA051184.) Petition for review after the Court of Appeal conditionally reversed a remanded a judgment of conviction of criminal offenses. This case presents the following issue: When a judgment becomes final, but is later vacated, altered, or amended and a new sentence imposed, is the case no longer final for the purpose of applying an intervening ameliorative change in the law? (See also People v. Federico, S263082 (#20-231).

#20-233 People v. Emairi, S263170. (C088844; nonpublished opinion; San Joaquin County Superior Court; STKCRFECOD20150005573.) Petition for review after the Court of Appeal affirmed a judgment of conviction of criminal offenses. The court ordered briefing deferred pending decision in People v. Lopez, S258175 (#19-172), which presents the following issues: (1) Does Senate Bill No. 1437 (Stats. 2018, ch. 1015) apply to attempted murder liability under the natural and probable consequences doctrine? (2) In order to convict an aider and abettor of attempted willful, deliberate and premeditated murder under the natural and probable consequences doctrine, must a premeditated attempt to murder have been a natural and probable consequence of the target offense? In other words, should People v. Favor (2012) 54 Cal.4th 868 be

reconsidered in light of *Alleyne v. United States* (2013) 570 U.S. 99 and *People v. Chiu* (2014) 59 Cal.4th 155?

#20-234 People v. Jenkins, S263400. (C085180; nonpublished opinion; Sacramento County Superior Court; 16FE008258.) Petition for review after the Court of Appeal remanded for resentencing in part, and otherwise affirmed a judgment of conviction of criminal offenses. The court ordered briefing deferred pending decision in People v. Lemcke, S250108 (#18-136), which presents the following issue: Does instructing a jury with CALCRIM No. 315 that an eyewitness's level of certainty can be considered when evaluating the reliability of the identification violate a defendant's due process rights?

#20-235 *People v. Molina, S263296*. (B301642; nonpublished opinion; Los Angeles County Superior Court; NA023660.) Petition for review after the Court of Appeal affirmed an order denying a post-judgment motion in a criminal matter.

#20-236 People v. Windham, S263030. (H047278; nonpublished opinion; Monterey County Superior Court; MCR4493.) Petition for review after the Court of Appeal affirmed an order denying a post-judgment motion in a criminal matter.

The court ordered briefing in *Molina* and *Windham* deferred pending decision in *People v. Lewis*, S260598 (#20-78), which presents the following issues: (1) May superior courts consider the record of conviction in determining whether a defendant has made a prima facie showing of eligibility for relief under Penal Code section 1170.95? (2) When does the right to appointed counsel arise under Penal Code section 1170.95, subdivision (c)?
